Parent Governor Vacancies:

Unfortunately, we didn't receive any nominations for the two current Parent Governor vacancies on our Governing Body. I fully understand your reservations regarding applying at this time of uncertainty, whereby everyone feels time deprived but, it is essential that we fill these positions.

In summary, the Governing Body is responsible for both the conduct of the School and for promoting high standards.

In terms of meetings and time commitment – we have one full Governing Body meeting per term for all members to attend and this generally lasts about two hours. Governors are also allocated a committee, which again meets once a term for approximately an hour and a half – although there may be some research and reading to do in preparation for this. These meetings are currently being held remotely but we are working towards more face to face meetings later in the year.

All new governors receive training and are appointed a mentor to support them in their role.

The only requirements are that you have an interest in the School and in the welfare of the pupils as well as the time and willingness to become involved.

As I stated in the last newsletter, ideally, we would like to create a Governing Body which better reflects the diverse nature of our school community; achieving a more representative gender and cultural mix within our Governing Body. However, all applications will be very gratefully received.


Nursery Parents Evening:

<u>LFT testing—half term:</u>

As an extra measure to protect our local school communities we are advising all primary school pupils to do two LFD tests, 3-5 days apart, with the second one the night before returning to school after the break. This measure has been shown to be highly effective at reducing the spread of the virus in secondary schools and



by taking this important one-off action now at half-term we can help to keep the number of cases low in our primary schools.

All tests are free and can be accessed in the following ways:

- Pick up free rapid test kits from a local pharmacy. Find your nearest one at https://www.islington.gov.uk/social-care-and-health/coronavirus-covid-19/how-to-book-a-test
- Order free rapid test kits to be delivered to your home within 24 hours at gov.uk/order-coronavirus-rapid-lateral-flow-tests (Please note on local public health advice these kits can be ordered for testing in under 11s)
